BOARD MATTERS

* Addition of Kat Carey to the Board

Following the 1/8/23 meeting, Kat Carey was nominated to join the SGH Board. Today the vote was unanimous to approve her joining the Board. Welcome, Kat!

* Introduction of Jonathan Micancin

Welcome to Jonathan Micancin, YHC Biology professor, joining us for the first time as Lead Facilitator for Towns and Union Counties.

* Scholarship Fund

SGH is establishing Donna Shearer Scholarship Fund at University of North Georgia in Dahlonega to honor her as she is retiring, and Buz provided an overview. The plan outlines that the administrator at UNG will decide the scholarship application process; Donna will review the applications, assist in the interview process, and make an advisory decision about who the recipient will be. The scholarship is to be awarded at the end of sophomore year, and the recipient can reapply for junior/senior years. The fund goal is a \$40,000 endowment at UNG.

* Executive Director Transition

The transition is going splendidly. Holly has taken over almost all of Donna's former activities. The only tasks that still need relocation, but not to Holly, are Web Master, Injector Maintainer, and Membership Coordinator. Donna would like to continue answering the Hemlock Help Line.

EDUCATION

* Clinics and Facilitator Training

We need to find more effective ways to reach out to specific focus groups (garden clubs, recreation groups, etc.). Buz encouraged those present to reach out to program managers. Donna stated we need to reach out to group leaders and encourage them to let their members know about upcoming training opportunities. Chris suggested reaching out to Chambers of Commerce to get contact names for each county. Jim W. mentioned having a sign-up sheet/ at each festival- for upcoming Clinics and Facilitator Training Workshops.

Jonathan will utilize a class period/lab period to teach clinic and facilitator training to his Conservation Biology students. Donna suggested we could also try this at UNG, Dalton State, and Lanier Tech. Students would receive credit, and could then add SGH Facilitator to their resume or CV. Jim W. said one of his treatment sites is at Ivy Log Gap, so if Jonathan trains his students, they could fulfill the volunteer requirement at Jim's Ivy Log treatment project.

Jimmy Stewart, Dan Reynolds, and Ally Bartholomew have led crews to treat over 7,000 trees in NW GA, Signal Mtn TN, and Grandview. Holly requested information on ways to best assist them in their efforts i.e. injectors, etc. Donna said if they need more injectors or chemical, we can provide assistance. SGH is exploring grant opportunities in the NW Georgia area.

Fannin Middle project: GPTV did a special on FCMS STEM program. Jim W, Buz and J. T. Kieffer with Terramedics assisted students in treating around 20 trees on campus. Donna and Holly taught 5 classes for 6th grade students prior to the treatment. The school has requested additional SGH assistance to treat around 100 trees on the Hwy 76 side of the school entrance later this year. Holly reached out to administrators regarding future development of the area and is waiting for response to continue with the project

* Paddling Treatment Projects

Jonathan requested status of treatment project between SGH and GA Canoeing Association. Per Jim W. USFS is still interested, they are waiting from a commitment from paddling association. Jim W said it's a project that could be done if we can find a group willing to partner. Jonathan stated he could log events on GA Canoeing Association if SGH handles planning the projects. Jim W will reach out to Dave for additional information about previous similar projects, and let him know Jonathan is interested in assisting. Donna noted we had done customized training for paddlers in the past for Cartecay projects. We could potentially consider this for both Cartecay and Chattooga Rivers. Jim W noted we'll finish the Cartecay treatment first, then move on to the Chattooga.

Kat noted it may be beneficial to reach out to some of the rafting/excursion companies.

* Saplings & Planting Projects

Buz is in the final phase of the Billy Goat Island Project, a 25-acre island on Lake Burton. He has flagged 3 north facing coves on the island where 50 saplings will be planted. He's taking materials to the island via barge this week. Volunteers from Lake Burton will meet SGH at Murray Cove on April 29th, divide into 3 teams, and take a pontoon out to the island to plant the saplings. Buz will get a pledge from one member of each team who will be responsible for watering the trees. John S. said to monitor the root ball to gauge water requirements of the recently planted trees. John noted that trees planted in conifer bark need additional water. Donna noted we shouldn't plant in a bark mix. We'll need to take the trees out of the bark mix and add it to native soil, with soil amendments.

Buz is asked to follow up on sapling dig at Rabun County property. There's also an opportunity in Mineral Bluff and another in Gilmer County.

* Soil Injector Repair

Donna has two volunteers interested in injector repair.

* Other

Concerning Facilitator visit requests: we do not charge for services, but we request reimbursement for chemical cost if the client is willing and able to do so. Chris/Buz noted to bring donation form during the visit to prevent homeowners from having to mail in reimbursement for chemical.
